Paying for I-901 SEVIS fee

You must pay a fee for your I-20 **<u>before</u>** you can apply for a Student Visa. Please check your I-20 for any errors. If you find any errors, contact us right away. To pay the fee visit: <u>www.fmjfee.com</u>.

- Be sure to use a computer with a printer because you will need to print your receipt.

Applying for the Student (F-1) Visa

- 1. Make an appointment with the U.S. Consulate/Embassy in your home country. <u>http://www.usembassy.gov/</u> (Click on the map to find the list of countries)
- Prepare your documents for the visa interview.
 Tip: Check your home country's US embassy/consulate for required documents and updated information.
- 3. Go to your visa interview
 - Tip: Make sure you have all the required documents.
 - Tip: Know your documents. Can you answer the following questions? (These questions are only examples.)
 - Why do you want to study in the U.S./Hawaii/IMPAC?
 - What is the name of your school? How did you pick your school?
 - What is an I-20 Form?
 - Who will pay for your studies? How much money will you have each month?
 - How long will you study at IMPAC? What will you do after studying at IMPAC?
 - What is the name of your program? (Answer: IEPP)
 - When will you start your program? (Answer: e.g. Q2-16 or "Spring Term"). If you are not sure, check our Term Calendar on our website at <u>http://impachawaii.edu/iepp.php</u>).
- 4. After you receive your visa, check the information on the visa. If you see any errors, you need to contact the embassy/consulate immediately!

Remember! You can only enter the U.S. up to 30 days before your program start date.

IMPAC is an accredited English-language school founded in 1991 on the island of O'ahu in the state of Hawai'i. Hawai'i offers a wonderful "ohana" (family) atmosphere in which to study English in a multi-cultural setting.

IMPAC will help improve your English skills and assist you in your language-learning goals--whether for travel, business, or day-to-day life in the United States. We offer small classes where you can interact with your classmates and build on your knowledge and skills of grammar, listening, speaking, reading, writing, vocabulary and idioms.

About Our Program, IEPP

Intensive English Proficiency Program (IEPP) is a twelve-week course offered four times a year in January, April, July and October. You are required to obtain an F-1 Visa to attend this program. IEPP has six levels, from beginner to advanced, designed to accommodate long-term students studying for three months or more. IEPP is perfect for you, if you would like to gain a deeper understanding of the English language or if you are planning to go to a college or university after completion of this program.

Daily Class Schedule and Proficiency Levels

You are required to attend 18 hours per week of classes to maintain your student status in the U.S. You will be placed into your proficiency level (see chart below). For all proficiency levels, classes are Monday through Friday (8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays).

About Hawai'i

Hawai'i became the 50th U.S. state in 1959 but its history dates back roughly 1500 years when the Polynesians from the Marquesas Islands set foot on the Big Island (the Island of Hawai'i). Ancient Hawai'i was ruled by chiefs and its people followed the laws known as *kapu*. In 1810, King Kamehameha, the chief of the Big Island conquered and united Hawai'i. The economy of Hawai'i bloomed in the 20th century with the development of sugar and pineapple plantations which brought Japanese, Chinese, Filipino and Portuguese immigrants to Hawai'i. This mix of immigrant ethnicities is what makes the population of Hawai'i so unique today!

Quick Facts about Hawai'i

- Hawai'i has 8 major islands- Hawai'i (the Big Island), Maui, O'ahu, Kaua'i, Lana'i, Ni'ihau, Kaho'olawe
- Nick name: "The Aloha State", "Aloha" in Hawaiian has many meanings but is generally used to say "Hello" or "Good bye". "Mahalo" is another Hawaiian word that you will hear often. "Mahalo" means "Thank you".
- Kilauea volcano on the Big Island is the only active volcano in the United States
- Currency: US dollar (\$)

Getting Ready

Are you excited to be in Hawai'i? We hope you are! Hawai'i is a beautiful place surrounded by the world's best beaches, tropical forests and magnificent mountains. We want you to have a great experience while you are here, so we would like to give you some tips.

Weather

The weather in Hawai'i is wonderful all year around with only two seasons: Summer (May-Oct) and winter (Nov-Apr). Temperatures at sea level generally range from 29-32 °C during the summer months and 26-28 °C during the winter months.

The sub-tropical climate is also paradise for insects and pests like ants, cockroaches and mosquitoes, so do keep your living spaces clean!

<u>What to Wear In Hawai'i</u>

The weather in Hawai'i is normally warm or hot during the day but it can be chilly in the morning and in the evening during the winter (November- April). We recommend that you bring some long-sleeved clothes and a light jacket. It can also be cold on TheBus and in stores and restaurants from the air conditioning.

<u>Safety</u>

Honolulu is known as one of the safest cities in the United States. However, there are few things to keep in mind. You can read the "Safety Tips" page on our website.
